QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1. Eucharist is derived from Greek word 'Eucharistia' which means?

Answer: Thanksgiving

2. What is the heart of the Eucharist celebration?

<u>Answer:</u> At the heart of the Eucharistic celebration are **the bread and wine** that, by the words of Christ and the **invocation of the Holy Spirit, become Christ's Body and Blood**.

3. What are Catholics beliefs of the Eucharist?

Answer: Catholics believe that :

- 4 Jesus is truly present in the Sacrament of the Eucharist.
- The Eucharist is known as the SOURCE (Foundation) and SUMMIT of Catholic Faith.
- The church becomes the sacrament of Jesus; a sign that the spirit of Jesus is an ongoing presence in the world.
- The Eucharist unites a person with the mystery of Jesus. It celebrates the memory of life, death & Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

4. What is Eucharist often called? Why?

Answer: Eucharist is often called "a memorial," or a meal of remembrance.

We recall the,

- life and teaching of Jesus; by listening & reflecting on the readings stated in the Scriptures.
- Jewish Passover meal that Jesus shared at the Last Supper, when Jesus told his closest friends to "do this in memory of me" (Lk 22:19).
- In each celebration of the Eucharist, we remember Jesus' sacrificial death on the cross, through which he made salvation possible for all humanity.

5. What does the Catechism of Catholic Church (CCC) 1365 say of the Eucharist?

<u>Answer:</u> In the Eucharist, Christ gives us the very body which he gave up for us on the cross, the very blood which he poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins".

6. What is the place where the Scriptures (Liturgy of the word) are proclaimed called?

Answer: Ambo.

7. What is the place of the breaking of the bread (Liturgy of the Eucharist) called?

Answer: Altar.

8. At the "Communion Rite" what does the word "Amen" – as our response to the words, "The body of Christ": mean?

Answer: "AMEN" comes from a Hebrew word that means "yes, this is certain". It expresses the speaker's belief that Christ is truly present in the bread and wine.

9. What are the two parts of the Eucharistic Celebration? <u>Answer:</u> The two parts of the Eucharistic celebration – the Liturgy of the Word,

and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.




ACTIVITY: WHAT IS THE EUCHARIST?

1. This means "giving thanks to God" and refers to the Body and Blood, and the Mass as a whole event.

3. Said by everyone at the finish of the Eucharistic Prayer.

4. Handshake, kiss, or hug that we share with one another at Mass.

5. When the priest breaks the consecrated bread into smaller pieces so it can be shared.

6. This litany is sometimes spoken, sometimes sung, as we recall how Jesus is our Paschal Lamb.

7. This refers to the consecrated bread and wine, and to all the people who are part of the Church.

8. The table from where the Holy Eucharist are consecrated.

9. At the final part of the Eucharist, we are sent out to do this.
