FORMATION 8: THE KINGDOM OF GOD

What is Meant by the Kingdom of God?

In the bible, there are events that point to the Kingdom of God's power. Jesus healed and cast out demons. He fed the hungry and even raised the dead. Later, Jesus defeats death on the cross and we see the power of resurrection.

These are all a part of the Kingdom of God when we understand that God reigns over all things.

From the coming of Jesus Christ to begin the kingdom, through the whole story of redemptive history and the Church, we see a clear picture of the Gospel.

This "kingdom of God" is mentioned in the Scriptures in several different ways throughout the Old and New Testaments:

Matthew 6:33, Mark 1:14-15, and Luke 4:43 all refer to the "kingdom of Christ."

Matthew 13:41 and 20:21 refer to the "kingdom of Christ and God."

Ephesians 5:5 refers to the "kingdom of David."

Mark 11:10 refers to "the kingdom."

Matthew 3:2, 4:17, 8:12, 13:14, and 13:29 refer to the "kingdom of heaven."

For Jesus, the kingdom of God is the Reign of God's love over the hearts of the people based on unconditional love for one another.

Therefore, Jesus' proclamation of the Kingdom contained two key elements:-

- 1. Jesus called God, Abba ie. in today's term Daddy. Not just the kingly creator of the universe/giver of the law; was an intimate and passionately loving parent.
- 2. We are all brothers and sisters. Need to love our neighbor i.e. to love all not just fellow Jews in Jesus' time. Jesus radically changed this belief to the point of telling them they must love even their enemies. Story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10: 29-37)

Luke 17:20-21 - "The kingdom of God is among you" suggests two things:-

Jesus himself possesses the Kingdom of God and has been called by God to make it real in the world.

As resurrected Jesus is present among us today, we can truly get in touch with God by looking deeply within ourselves. When we spend time reflecting on ourselves and our life experiences, we will often find the wisdom that we continually seem to seek from sources outside ourselves.

The whole idea of the Kingdom of God was central to everything Jesus said and did. For instance, many of His parables begin with the statement "The Kingdom of God is like..."

(a mustard seed, the sowing of seed, baking bread, etc.).

Jesus' miracles were signs of the presence of the Kingdom that Jesus was establishing among people.

THE HIDDEN TREASURE AND THE PEARL OF GREAT PRICE



"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field. When a man found it, he hid it again, and then in his joy went and sold all he had and bought that field."

"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant seeking beautiful pearls, who, when he had found one pearl of great price, went and sold all that he had and bought it."

Parable of a Mustard Seed Another parable put he forth unto them, saying, The kingdom of heaven is like to a grain of mustard seed, which a man took, and sowed in his field Which indeed is the least of all seeds: but when it is grown, it is the greatest among herbs, and becometh a tree, so that the birds of the air come and lodge in the branches thereof. Matthew 13 31-32





"And He said, "The Kingdom of God is as if a man should scatter seed on the ground. 27 He sleeps and rises night and day, and the seed sprouts and grows; he knows not how."

Jesus presented another parable to them, saying, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a man who sowed good seed in his field. 25 But while his men were sleeping, his enemy came and sowed tares among the wheat, and went away."

⁴⁷ Again, the kingdom of heaven is like unto a net, that was cast into the sea, and gathered of every kind: ⁴⁸ Which, when it was full, they drew to shore, and sat down, and gathered the good into vessels, but cast the bad away.

Who do you know that possesses these strengths? Whom would you call blessed?

1. Who had lots of talent but refuse to be a bragger (boastful)?

Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted

2. With whom can you share your deepest emotions – joy and silliness as well as sadness and anger – without feeling laughed at or embarrassed?

Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth

3. Who do not fight for their own advantage?

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst after righteousness, for they shall be filled

4. Who do you know that tries always to be fair and just?

Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy

5. Who refuses to ignore or tease someone who is struggling and needs help? Who chooses to extend mercy rather than blame or scorn?

Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God.

6. Who do you know that quietly and steadily tries to put God first in his or her life?

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called children of God

7. Who do you know that seeks peaceful solutions and refuses to get even or seek revenge?

Blessed are those who have been persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven

8. Who do you know that is willing to face ridicule, teasing, trouble, or inconvenience to see that the right thing is done?

Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Depend on God for everything. Live a simple and obedient life.

Blessed are those who mourn for they shall be comforted.


Grieve over wrong-doing and evil that is done

Kind, forgiving and generous


Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God.

Blessed are those who are persecuted in the cause of right, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven




The Beatitudes are

Attitudes: they tell you what you should BE like, rather than what you should DO. You have to be willing to put yourself last, and put up with others. You have to be more generous than it is fair to be.

In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus tells his disciples and the people listening, not to put their lighted candles under a bucket or cover it up so it can't be seen. If

you want light, you need to put your lamp where it can shine. That means our individual light. If we have talents, God doesn't want us to hide them, but to use them.

But the Beatitudes are also Blessings: They all begin "Blessed are the..." This is because in return for your generosity, and putting yourself last, you are given the happiness of being close to God and having the Kingdom of **Heaven** within you - that nothing can take away.
